INTRODUCTION

On Thursday 6 May 2021, the voters of Greater Manchester will be voting to elect the Mayor of Greater Manchester.

In addition to the Greater Manchester Combined Authority Mayoral Election, a Salford City Mayoral Election and Local Elections for all Councils in Greater Manchester will be held on Thursday 6 May 2021. In the Local Elections, all seats in Salford and a third of the seats in the other nine districts (Bolton, Bury, Manchester, Oldham, Rochdale, Stockport, Tameside, Trafford and Wigan) are up for election.

Residents who are registered to vote in Bolton, Bury, Manchester, Oldham, Rochdale, Salford, Stockport, Tameside, Trafford and Wigan are able to vote in these elections.

The Combined Authority Returning Officer is required by law to send a copy of this Election Booklet, about the Greater Manchester Combined Authority Mayoral Election, to every registered elector in Greater Manchester. The Booklet contains:

- a list of every candidate standing in the election in alphabetical order
- information about the Mayor of Greater Manchester and how the Mayor is elected
- information on how to complete your ballot paper, how you can vote, and what to expect at your polling station
- an Election Address from each of the candidates who has opted to be included in this booklet.

THE MAYOR OF GREATER MANCHESTER

What does the Mayor of Greater Manchester do?

The Greater Manchester Combined Authority (GMCA) was established in 2011 and is a legal entity in its own right. The ten Greater Manchester councils appoint one of its elected members as a member of the GMCA. In practice, since 2011, that has been the council leader (or in Salford's case, the elected City Mayor of Salford) and since 2017, it has included the directly elected Mayor of Greater Manchester who is the eleventh member and Chair of the GMCA. The ten leaders continue to lead their own councils. The Mayor has various powers and responsibilities, including the fire and rescue service, transport, the functions of a Police and Crime Commissioner, and acting as an ambassador for the city region.

The Mayor also has important powers over housing and planning within the region, including control of the £300million Greater Manchester Housing Investment Fund, and has a duty to produce a Spatial Development Strategy (SDS) that covers the GMCA area.

Decision-making

The Mayor is able to make some decisions independently. Some of the Mayor's decisions require consultation with and the approval of the GMCA. Certain decisions are made by the GMCA and Mayor together, e.g. the Spatial Development Strategy must be approved by a unanimous vote of the council leaders.

Decisions are subject to scrutiny by one or more overview and scrutiny committees made up of members of the ten Greater Manchester councils. A Greater Manchester Police, Fire and Crime Panel scrutinises decisions of the Mayor that relate to the Mayor's Police and Crime Commissioner role and the Mayor's fire and rescue functions.

How is the Mayor elected?

The Mayor is elected using the Supplementary Voting system. This means that voters have the opportunity to choose their first and second choice candidate. This is different to the system of first past the post used in local and parliamentary elections.

If one candidate gets more than half of the first choice votes, then they will be elected as the Mayor of Greater Manchester. If no candidate gets more than half of the first choice votes, then the two candidates with the most first choice votes go into a second round. All other candidates are eliminated. Any second choice votes from the eliminated candidates, which have been cast for the top two candidates remaining in the contest, will then be counted and added to their first choice totals. The candidate who has the highest overall total will be declared the Mayor of Greater Manchester.

Completing your ballot paper

Please take time to read the instructions below, which provide more information on how to complete your Combined Authority Mayoral Election ballot paper (yellow ballot paper).

- You have the opportunity to cast your vote for your first and second choice candidate
- Vote by putting a cross [x] in the box in column A next to your FIRST CHOICE candidate
- Vote by putting a cross [x] in the box in column B next to your SECOND CHOICE candidate
- Your first and second choices should be different
- If you only mark a second choice, your vote will not be counted.

HOW YOU CAN VOTE

At your polling station

Before 6 May 2021, you should have received a poll card, which includes the name and address of your polling station. Check your poll card carefully as your polling station may have changed. You can only vote at the polling station stated on this card. You do not need to take the poll card with you in order to vote, but it may save time if you do.

Polling stations will be open between 7am and 10pm for you to cast your vote.

When you arrive in the polling station, you will be asked for your name and address. Staff will check you are on the electoral register and then give you ballot papers for all elections.

Significant effort has been made to make polling stations COVID-19 safe. Health and safety assessments have been carried out on all polling stations and measures put in place to protect staff and voters. You will be required to wear a face covering unless you have a reasonable excuse not to do so, and use hand sanitiser on arrival, which will be made available at the polling station. The layout will ensure you remain socially distanced from other electors and staff. Please bring your own pen or pencil to vote if you wish to do so.

If you have any questions about arrangements at your polling station ahead of polling day, please contact your Elections Office for further information.

Applying to vote by post

Anyone who is registered to vote can apply to vote by post. Your poll card provides information about how to apply for a postal vote. New applications for a postal vote must have been received by your Elections Office by **5pm on Tuesday 20 April 2021**. If by the time you receive this Election Booklet the postal vote application deadline has passed, there is still time to appoint someone you trust to vote on your behalf as a proxy.

Applying to vote by proxy

Your poll card provides information about how to apply for a proxy vote. Your proxy must be a registered elector and eligible to vote in these elections, as well as being able to vote on your behalf at your usual polling station. The deadline for receipt of new applications for a proxy vote is **5pm on Tuesday 27 April 2021**.

There are also some limited circumstances in which an emergency proxy can be appointed including if you have COVID-19 or need to isolate on election day.

By post

If you are a registered postal voter, your postal vote will be sent to you around Friday 23 April 2021.

You should follow the instructions in the postal ballot pack very carefully. The ballot paper(s) and the postal voting statement should be sent back in the return envelope provided.

This must reach your Elections Office by 10pm on Thursday 6 May 2021. If you miss the post, you can hand it in at your Elections Office, or at any polling station in your electoral area before 10pm on Thursday 6 May 2021.

Additional support

The Combined Authority Returning Officer together with the Returning Officers in the ten local authority areas are committed to ensuring that everyone who wants to vote can do so by providing:

- Polling stations that are accessible
- Tactile voting devices to enable voters with visual impairments to vote in person
- Large-print versions of ballot papers
- The option for voters to take a companion (close relative or elector qualified to vote at these elections) with them for assistance
- Polling-station staff trained to provide assistance where required.

Multilingual resources

All voting material in polling stations is in English. However, translations of key information will be available in Arabic, Bangla, Cantonese, Farsi, Kurdish Sorani, Mandarin, Polish, Punjabi, Somali and Urdu.
